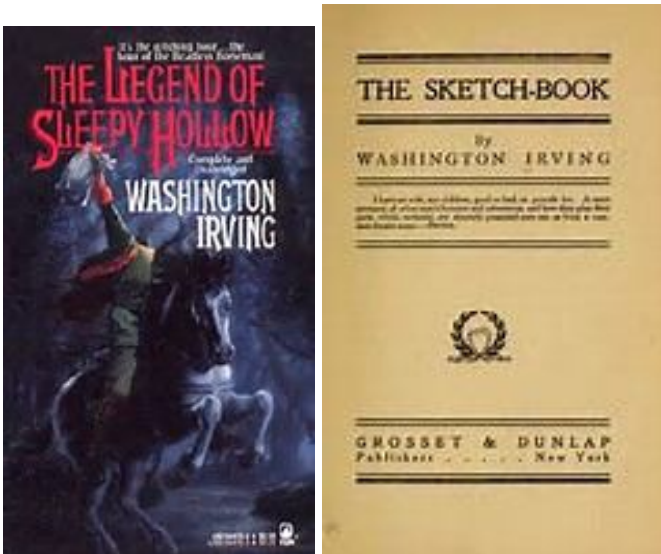
**STEVEN ECKL:** This was in Chicago for me also.
